
Decode It: Fruits Grown Here!

Decode the word scrambles to find the names of some of these delicious fruits!







Clue: This huge fruit is originally from Africa. It grows on a vine. It has a green rind outside, and it's bright red or pink inside.

oorspus = |




Clue: This native fruit gets its name from its unique sweet and sour taste! It's green and prickly on the outside, and white and juicy inside. It's often made into juice.

Clue: Originally from South Asia, it's been grown here for centuries. It's orange-yellow inside, with one big pit. People love it fresh, as juice, and in chutneys, sauces and desserts.

drimaant =



Clue: This African fruit looks like a big brown pod, with sweet, tangy pulp inside. On St. Martin, it's used for juice, in bush tea, and to make special sweets and other foods.
